



Military Career of Bruce D. Tavey

Bruce Tavey's family put down roots in Central Valley at the end of WWII. Bruce is the oldest son of Bill & Lillie Tavey, and the brother of Jim & Dennis (Corky) Tavey. They moved to Flower Street, where the family home still stands. Bill and Lillie owned and operated a service station and machine shop in Pine Grove. After a few years, Bill became Deputy Sheriff under Sheriff John Balma, where he was assigned to the Shasta Dam Area towns. He worked with Deputy Sheriff Guy Malcolm, and eventually Bill became the first Sheriff of Lake Shasta aka "Tavey's Navy". Lilly was a homemaker, card player and volunteer for many things including the Old Plane Watch Tower at the VFW Hall during the Korean War.


Bruce attended Shasta Union High School for 4 years, graduating in 1950. After graduation he joined the Navy, *pursuing a dream of serving on a Submarine*. He became intrigued with submarines while living in Vallejo during WWII. His folks had worked at the Mare Island Naval Shipyard, a submarine base. Bruce, along with Rueben Kuehne, joined the Navy and they were sent to San Diego Boot Camp. It was there he applied for Submarine Service. He was told the only opening on a submarine was for cooks and bakers. His Chief, at the time, had taken a liking to Bruce because he boxed for his company at the Sunday Smokers, winning every


fight. Bruce was asked where he learned to box, and answered, he hadn't really learned to box but had learned his survival / fighting skills at the Covered Wagon, Silver Dollar and Rainbow Club (Pow-Wow). The Chief then asked Bruce if he could cook. He said he had washed



Bruce was first assigned to a WWII submarine, The USS Bream SS243, followed by The USS Tunny SS282 and The USS Carbonero SS337. While on these submarines, he made two war patrols during the Korean

Conflict and one during the Vietnam Conflict. During these patrols, they recovered downed pilots and kept the few Korean Navy Ships in their harbors, just by letting their presence be known. In the early 50's, Bruce was in the first group of Nuclear Submarine Trainers. He was trained as a Nuclear Reactor Operator carrying out that duty for the next 15 years. Bruce retired from the Navy in 1970. He immediately started working for the US Navy Nuclear Reactors Division under






second career, after another 20 years, his final position was the Production Manager for all the Navy Nuclear Construction, Repair and Refueling west of the Mississippi, which included San Francisco Bay Area, San Diego, Hawaii, Nevada, Washington, Guam, Japan, and shipboard at Sea Pacific.


Bruce has been married for 60 years, to Vicki Rogers Tavey, from Project City, who also graduated from SUHS in 1950. They have 3 children, 7 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren. They now live in Redding.

Bruce Tavey's Career Highlights include:

- USS Skate, the first submarine that surfaced at the North Pole. In March of 1959, after traveling 3900 miles under the ice and surfacing 10 times before reaching the North Pole, she was able to surface and they spread the ashes of Sir Hubert Wilkins, an Arctic Explorer with Admiral Bird, at the North Pole.
- USS Skate, was the submarine in the movie "Ice Station Zebra" starring Rock Hudson & Ernest Borgnine, and filmed at the Army installation Floating Ice Station Alpha. When she surfaced at the Floating Ice Station, the troops stationed there learned that an ice cream machine was on board, and they loved the soft serve ice cream. Ironically, a cold front caused them to use explosives to break away and exit the area.







- USS Skate, had a rendezvous with the USS Seadragon, and together they surfaced at the North Pole. Cold and dry with no breeze, it allowed them to picnic and have a soft ball game. The pitcher's mound was placed directly on the North Pole and a home run hit literally..... ran them "around the world".
- USS Tecumseh, a ballistic missile submarine during the Viet Nam and Cold War. As Chief. Tavey had each of the 16 missile tube hatches painted like pool balls, and called the missile compartment, The Covered Wagon. ("No one ever understood my logic, but no one disagreed either.")
- Awards and Medals included: 3 Presidential Citations, 3 Legions of Merit, 2 Navy Unit Citations, and the Navy Superior Civilian Service Medal (the second highest award for civilians).
